

don't see anything like this anywhere else and it always surprises me. But I think that it's more the *feel* when you're at The Greenbrier. It's a very calming experience to be here. Greenbrier Living: How would you describe the golf opportunities at The Greenbrier?

Greenbrier Living: When someone like you who has such a love for the game of golf, do you appreciate it when you get onto an old course like the Old White TPC course? Versus say, a more modern course.

Phil Mickelson: I think that the courses that were made in the early 1900s, before bulldozers came into play, used the natural environment as hazards much more, and the course is integrated into the ground. On modern day courses the environment tends to be created rather than already there. So, many of the great courses were built on great pieces of property because they didn't have the luxury of making whatever golf course on any piece of property, and so you feel the course is integrated in the natural environment. You feel as though you're more one with Nature. You feel as though it's more of a natural challenge, rather than an artificial challenge. And I think that's the lure that many tour pros have and all golfers, all lovers of the game, have to old-style golf courses. Certainly, that's the case here at the Old White TPC because that course was done so long ago that the holes and the nuances of the holes are built because of the land, not in spite of the land.

Greenbrier Living: Have you thought about where you would like to build your new home? We have so many options, from creek front, mountaintop, to golf course living.

Phil Mickelson: It's been difficult to decipher exactly where we want our lot, because the mountaintop offers such spectacular views, the creek offers easy access for fly fishing and water activities, and yet there's a lure for me to be on or next to the golf course. But, I'm kind of leaning towards something on the water.

Greenbrier Living: With the great seasonal weather that we have at The Greenbrier, do you know exactly when you'll be here or how long you'll spend time here?

Phil Mickelson: Originally, it made sense to be here just in the summers, but now with the possible addition of the new ski mountain, why wouldn't you be here year round? The Greenbrier offers something every month of the year. It's easy for me to access The Greenbrier when I'm back east playing the PGA TOUR as a break or preparation for other tournaments. So, during the summer months, it's very easy for me to be here, and I'll end up spending most of my time here during those months. But now with the ski mountain, we gotta look at the winter, too.

Greenbrier Living: So, you know that Bubba Watson has a home here, and so does Jerry West who is still a heck of a golfer. John Smoltz, as well. I don't think it'll be hard for you to get a game. Do you see some of the other pros coming to spend some time with you here and play some golf?

Phil Mickelson: Well, when you come here you kind of fall in love with the place. The Greenbrier sells itself, and so getting these tour pros here for the Greenbrier Classic, they all want to spend more time here. So, that's a lure for players. As they come here for the tournament they end up realizing how many activities there are for their family—how fun it is, and how they want to spend their downtime here. That is what ultimately sells it to the tour pros.

Greenbrier Living: Well, we're really happy to have you. You'll be a great addition to the Greenbrier community. Welcome aboard!

MODERN PACIFIC RIM CUISINE AND AN ELEGANT SPACE MAKE IN-FUSION A CROWD FAVORITE

n-Fusion offers Greenbrier guests and members a taste of the Pacific Rim, right here in the hills of West Virginia. Inspiration dishes comes from various Asian countries, such as Thailand, Korea, China, or Japan. They serve dishes that range from the familiar General Tso's chicken to the more exotic Bi Bim Bap. The Greenbrier's Executive Chef Brian Skelding makes sure there's something for everyone to enjoy, from children to adults. (Children are now allowed to dine at In-Fusion when escorted by an adult and casino official. Anyone under the age of 18 must leave the restaurant by 8:30 p.m., however, due to lottery laws.) Many courses of small plates are available for adventurous diners, so you can experience tastes from every country.

In-Fusion's beauty lies in its location. Settled in the heart of the casino, In-Fusion makes it easy to gamble, grab a bite to eat, and gamble some more, all without leaving the casino.

"When Jim Justice bought this property and we opened four new restaurants, the thought was, we attract people who would want to stay here for around three days, they can essentially eat at a different place every day and for every meal."

Fish is trucked into the restaurant daily, allowing for the freshest, tastiest sushi possible. Skelding uses a small company called Steve Connolly Seafood Company, rather than a big corporate business, to ensure supreme quality fish.

Skelding prepares a sample sushi platter, offering salmon, Ahi tuna, and sashimi, complimented by a Flaming California Roll that has crab salad inside with a bit of avocado. There is also the popular Dragon Roll, which has fried tempura shrimp and barbecued eel on the outside.

"Those are our two most popular rolls for sure," says Skelding.

The Lobster Spring Roll is a brand new dish for the

season. It comes with fresh mango, poached lobster, and a bit of carrots. The chef poaches the lobster with orange, lemons, and herbs, then wraps it with Thai basil and a few fried rice noodles to give it a bit of crispiness.

Skelding is particularly interested in the booming ramen scene. He is inspired by Ivan Orkin, of Ivan Ramen fame-a New Yorker who moved to Japan to pursue his love of cooking and Japanese culture,

eventually opening restaurants in Tokyo and NYC.

In-Fusion's sushi bar gives patrons the experience of having their own personal chef, according to Skelding. "My wife and I always sit at the sushi bar when at sushi restaurants. I just think it almost makes you feel like you're in the kitchen because everyone's really kind of behind you. It's almost like you're the only one there sometimes—like a chef's table experience."

Open Thursday through Sunday, In-Fusion is an exotic weekend retreat. Whether you're looking for a pre-gaming meal, or just a culinary excursion to the other side of the world, In-Fusion provides a warm, inviting atmosphere for the hotel's modern interpretation of Asian classics.

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


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Town & Country THEN AND NOW

ifteen years ago, *Town & Country* magazine collaborated with The Greenbrier Sporting Club developer to build a house from scratch on a ¾ acre lot. This house had to be built within their allotted budget, fully furnished, and would eventually be put on the market for \$4.5 million. *Town & Country* staff put themselves in the shoes of a client—hired a contractor, designer, and architect who could work well together to create a home that fit within The Greenbrier's building guidelines.

Town & Country wanted a house that would be about 4,500 square feet—a contemporary home that was stylish and easygoing, but as low-maintenance as possible. Architect Donald Rattner elaborates on the design in the October 2002 issue of Town & Country: "We wanted to create a balance between openness, which we felt was modern and welcoming, and a grounded feeling, an anchor to the earth." Inside, the first floor holds the public rooms—a study, great room, dining room, family room, kitchen, and two porches. These rooms are designed to open directly into one another, avoiding corridors and doors to make the spaces feel naturally connected.

As for the décor, interior designer Victoria Hagen drew her inspiration from her childhood days spent playing in the forest. Upstairs, the space is "like being in a tree houselighter and airier," she told *Town & Country*. The children's rooms are inspired by winter, with light blues and whites. The



sharp colors simulating the joy of seeing the first flowers in

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


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


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
